Rural Global Health Partnership Initiative

Program Guidelines

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Rural Global Health Partnership Initiative (RGHPI) is to support partnerships between rural BC physicians and underserved communities in BC, Canada, and internationally.

Global Health is defined as "the area of study, research and practice that places a priority on improving health and achieving equity in health for all people worldwide" (Koplan, et al). More simply, it is "a discipline that advances efforts to improve the well-being of people and the planet." (K. Martin, CUGH). "Global Health 3.0" as defined by CIHR is "where health is understood to be an outcome of globally shared risks and responsibilities that require collective action to achieve good heath for all."

Planetary Health

The climate crisis is also and global health crisis. The climate crisis is also a health equity crisis, with the most vulnerable populations the most significantly impacted. Health professionals will be at the frontline of these challenges and will see the volume and nature of the illnesses they treat directly impacted by climate change.

The goals of this initiative are:

- to promote and enhance capacity for generalism in the health services of communities in rural BC;
- to foster reciprocal learning in diverse health systems and community contexts;
- to demonstrate how global and planetary health (local and international) community partnerships can heighten awareness, create innovative solutions to address healthcare challenges in rural BC, Canada, and globally, and lead to improved health outcomes, especially for underserved, marginalized, and Indigenous populations.

ELIGIBILITY AND REQUIREMENTS

Eligible applicants:

 BC physicians with experience practicing rural medicine, extensive connections to rural communities, and a demonstrated interest in global health BC medical trainees (resident or medical student) with a demonstrated interest in rural medicine and global health (applicants from rural training sites will be prioritized by the review committee)

Criteria:

Projects must demonstrate a commitment to ethical partnership and aligned goals among all participants and participating communities and be based on the following principles:

- The project will significantly contribute to the enhancement of generalism and strengthening local capacity in health services underserved rural communities.
- 2. The project will result in sustainable benefits to partner communities.
- The project proposal reflects an evidence-based approach and provides clear rationale, methodology, and objectives consistent with the goals of the Rural Global Health Partnership Initiative
- 4. Expected project outcomes are well-defined and achievable.
- 5. The proposed budget is reasonable and in line with the objectives of the project.
- Partner communities and organizations have been significantly involved in the development of the project goals, expected outcomes, methodology, and evaluation process.

Project proposals by physicians that indicate that UBC medical students and residents will be involved or invited to participate will be given priority.

Activities ineligible for funding include:

- 1. Tuition costs for courses
- 2. Salary remuneration for applicants
- 3. Projects where no clear partner in the community served is identified (e.g., NGO, community organization, institution, etc.)
- 4. Projects where the primary focus is transient clinical service delivery by foreigners
- The partner community is not significantly involved in determining project focus, goals, methodology, and implementation



PROJECT PROPOSAL

APPLICATION DEADLINE

Application deadlines are April 30 and October 31. Only complete applications including all supporting documents will be reviewed.

FUNDING

Applicants may apply for grant categories up to \$5000 and \$10,000. This support can be applied towards project implementation, licensing fees, travel and living expenses. Travel and living expenses may not exceed \$3000 per application. Please note that proposals where the budget predominantly focuses on personal costs of travel will not be considered.

Funds may only be used for activities taking place after the approval of the application. Successful applicants will be asked to identify the recipient that will administer the funds (e.g., university, NGO, medical corporation, etc.). A T4A will be issued if the funding is received by an individual.

REPORTING

Successful applicants will be required to submit an interim progress report or end of project report no later than one year and 60 days after the date indicated on the grant acceptance form. A reporting template will be provided.
