

Do you have an emergency medical transport story to share?



You are invited to take part in a research study, called “Gathering narratives on emergency medical transport in British Columbia (BC) from providers, decision-makers and patients in rural, remote and First Nations communities.”

Study goal:

To better understand the experiences of physicians, nurses, health administrators, patients and their families related to emergency medical transportation from BC rural, remote and First Nations communities to larger hospitals in larger centres.

Who can participate:

We are looking for stories from the last 5 years from:

- Rural, remote and First Nations healthcare providers (physicians and nurses)
- Physicians and nurses who work in a small hospital emergency in a rural, remote or First Nations community
- Managers from health authorities (including the First Nations Health Authority) who have been involved in transport decisions and care
- Patients or family members of patients 19 years of age and older who experienced an emergency medical transport

The participation process:

A member of our research team will conduct a one-on-one interview with each participant via video conference or telephone. The interview will take 30 to 60 minutes.
