### Survey

In May 2021, the SPRUCe Medical Leads hosted two focus group discussions with rural pediatricians residing and practicing in RSA communities. The groups explored the challenges of practicing in a rural or underserved area. SPRUCe's five areas of focus were ranked by participants in order of importance as follows:

- 1. Recruitment
- 2. Locums
- 3. Education, training, mentorship
- 4. Outreach
- 5. Networking

Participants also shared what their most significant challenges are in rural pediatric practice, and the responses from the two separate meetings are shown in the word clouds below.






SPRUCe recently surveyed the pediatricians in RSA communities around key areas such as recruitment, outreach and education. Thank you to all who participated. We had a great response, with 87% (27/31 pediatricians) of RSA community pediatricians responding. Some interesting initial information includes:

#### 1) Demographics:

I work in a community as a:

- Solo pediatrician 6
- Dyad with one other pediatrician
- Small group of 3-5 pediatrician 8
- Medium sized group with >5 pediatricians
- Prefer not to say 1



#### 2) Concerns:

Recruitment is a significant concern for my community:

- Agree 9
- Strongly agree 13



#### 3) Areas of need:

Outreach clinics to small communities without a general pediatrician is important:

## **Reflections on Residency**

SPRUCe hosted a virtual "Reflections on Residency" session on May 12, 2021. Four pediatricians practicing in small to medium sized communities across BC reflected on their pediatric residency training and offered tips about how to tailor residency training to prepare for rural practice. The speakers were Dr. Jennifer Cutting (Trail), Dr. Alysha Mackenzie-Feder (Kelowna), Dr. Lara Malks-Jjumba (Prince George) and Dr. Francine Ling (Nanaimo). They were all enthusiastic proponents of practicing pediatrics in a community distant from BC Children's Hospital and the feedback from the resident attendees was positive. Kaie Rosborough, a 4th year pediatric resident at BC Children's Hospital, has joined the SPRUCe team as the resident representative. She is supporting a number of SPRUCe initiatives and is providing a resident perspective in discussions regarding rural and remote pediatrics.

## Did you know?

The SPRUCe metronomic locum program matches groups of 2 to 6 urban pediatricians to specific rural communities. The urban pediatricians provide locum coverage for 1 week at a time, at a frequency determined by the host community pediatricians.

The intention is that the locum pediatrician will return year after year to the host community. This gives the rural pediatricians the security of having locums predictably planned for the year, which allows them needed time off at reasonable intervals. In addition, having returning locum physicians minimizes the need for orientation and onboarding by busy rural pediatricians. Funding is from the Rural Specialist Locum Program. So far there are 17 urban pediatricians providing 39 weeks of locum coverage per year to various rural communities in BC.
