Rural Locum Support

The SPRUCe metronomic locum program was started in the spring of 2021. In this program, a small group of urban pediatricians are matched to a rural community with pediatricians who are in need of locum support. The urban pediatricians provide short locums (typically 7 days) and are expected to return periodically and regularly to provide predictable and reliable locum support. To date, this program involves 17 urban pediatricians providing support to Campbell River, Comox and Trail, and augmenting the established locum program in Terrace.

General Pediatrics Outreach

With the goal of developing an organized approach to pediatric outreach to rural areas without resident pediatricians, SPRUCe is supporting the initiation of a pediatric outreach clinic to Dawson Creek. Outreach to this community was provided for several years by a pediatrician who has now retired. SPRUCe has recruited 5 pediatricians to share in providing regular, ongoing outreach to Dawson Creek. Drs. Nita Jain, Mia Remington, Tom McLaughlin, Erin Peebles and Robyn Geier will each provide multi-day clinics twice per year in Dawson Creek, starting in November 2021.

Pathways - Streamlining referrals, improving patient care

Pathways is an online resource that provides physicians and their office staff/team quick access to current and accurate referral information, including wait times and areas of expertise of specialists and specialty clinics.

Pathways can also provide access to hundreds of patient and physician resources, as well as community service and allied health information that is categorized and searchable.

Funding for Pathways is provided through the General Practitioner Services Committee (GPSC), a joint collaboration between Doctors of BC and the BC government. Individual Divisions of Family Practice also contribute operational funding at a local level. Once logged in, there is wealth of information related to Pediatrics including patient handouts, videos, links to websites (including Child Health BC, Kelty Mental Health, Canadian Paediatric Society), questionnaires (SCARED, SNAP-IV, M-CHAT, etc.)
